A. Approval of Minutes (City Clerk)
Approve the City Council Special and Regular Minutes of February 28, 2022 and Special Minutes of March 7, 2022.

B. Findings Required by AB 361 for the Continued Use of Teleconferencing for Meetings (City Attorney)
For the City Council to continue to have the option to meet via teleconference during the pandemic, AB 361 requires the City Council make specific findings at least every thirty (30) days.

Recommendation: Make the following findings by a majority vote of the City Council:

1. A state of emergency has been proclaimed by California’s Governor due to the COVID-19 pandemic, and continues to be in effect; and,
2. The City Council has reconsidered the circumstances of the state of emergency; and,
3. State and local officials continue to recommend measures to promote social distancing to slow the spread of COVID-19.

C. Amendment to the Resolution Establishing Salaries and Benefits for Non-Represented Employees to Include Management Analyst (Administration)

This report outlines the personnel change for the Administration Department, City Manager’s Office.

Recommendation:

1. Adopt Resolution No. 2022-09, entitled, “A RESOLUTION OF CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOS ALAMITOS, CALIFORNIA, ADOPTING A JOB DESCRIPTION FOR MANAGEMENT ANALYST”; and,
2. Adopt Resolution No. 2022-10, entitled, “A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOS ALAMITOS, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING THE SALARIES AND BENEFITS FOR NON-REPRESENTED EMPLOYEES TO INCLUDE MANAGEMENT ANALYST”; and,
3. Approve a budget amendment for Fiscal Year 2021-2022 in the Administration Department for an additional \$32,260 for a full-time

Management Analyst position.

D. Notice of Completion for Cerritos Avenue Guardrail Repair Project (CIP No. 20/21-04) (Development Services)

The work for the Cerritos Avenue Guardrail Repair Project (CIP No. 20/21-04) has been completed. The work included repair of the damaged Cerritos Avenue Bridge guardrail.

Recommendation:

1. Accept as complete the construction by Peterson-Chase General Engineering Construction, Inc. for the Cerritos Avenue Guardrail Repair Project (CIP No. 20/21-04); and,
2. Direct the City Clerk to record the Notice of Completion/Final Report with the County Recorder's Office; and,
3. Authorize Staff to release the 5% retention to the contractor, in the amount of \$2,213.00 thirty-five (35) days after recordation of the Notice of Completion.

A. Public Hearing #4 (Continued) to Receive Input on the Draft Revised City Council District Boundaries and Select a Preferred District Boundary Map (City Clerk)

Pursuant to Elections Code section 21601, cities with by-district election systems are required to redraw their district boundary maps following each decennial federal census to ensure compliance with the California and federal Voting Rights Acts. The process to complete the redistricting requires a minimum of four public hearings and dedicated public outreach to ensure minority populations and communities of interest are aware of the redistricting effort and are provided with options to participate. The deadline for cities to complete the redistricting process is April 17, 2022. This Public Hearing was continued from March 7, 2022.

Recommendation:

1. Reopen the public hearing to receive public input on district boundaries; and,
2. Select a preferred District Boundary Map; and,
3. Introduce, waive reading in full and authorize reading by title only of Ordinance No. 2022-01, and set for adoption; and,

4. City Attorney Daudt read the title of Ordinance No. 2022-01, entitled, "AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOS ALAMITOS, CALIFORNIA, ADOPTING DISTRICT MAPS FOR THE CITY OF LOS ALAMITOS BY-DISTRICT ELECTIONS ."



The process to complete the redistricting requires a minimum of four public hearings and dedicated public outreach to ensure minority populations and communities of interest are aware of the redistricting effort and are provided with options to participate. The deadline for cities to complete the redistricting process is April 17, 2022.

Dr. Justin Levitt, National Demographic Corporation (NDC), gave a PowerPoint Presentation and explained that census data is provided by the Federal Government with census blocks being the smallest unit of census geography divided by jurisdictional boundaries or natural features visible on a map. Dividing a census block is feasible under very narrow sense of circumstances and/or by a court order and it leads to uncertainty regarding population.

Mayor Hasselbrink opened the Public Hearing for comments.

Maggie Marchese, resident, referred to Map 4 and stated a preference for keeping the one block on Farquhar in District 4 and keeping Carrier Row and Apartment Row together.

Mayor Hasselbrink closed the Public Hearing for comments.

- Dramatic changes to the boundaries in Map 2 with Apartment Row and Map 4 impacting District 1
- Proposed maps do not divide any census blocks
- Future growth can only be accounted for up to a 10% population deviation
- Concern for disjointed boundaries of District 1
- Preference for working with Map 2 as a base since it had a total population deviation of 3.05% and allowed for the most leigh way to make modifications
- Districts 4 and 5 are on the same election cycle and neither District were shown to lose any population

Motion/Second: Hasselbrink/Doby

Motion: Direct Staff to start with Map 2 and incorporate changes based off of comments received.

Council and Staff discussed the following:

- Population deviations between Map 2 and 3
- Approved maps are valid for 10 years regardless of population changes that occur after adoption

- Redistricting is triggered by release of Census data and not a deviation in population

Subject: Findings Required by AB 361 for the Continued Use of Teleconferencing for Meetings

SUMMARY

For the City Council to continue to have the option to meet via teleconference during the pandemic, AB 361 requires the City Council make specific findings at least every thirty (30) days.

RECOMMENDATION

Make the following findings by a majority vote of the City Council:

1. A state of emergency has been proclaimed by California's Governor due to the COVID-19 pandemic, and continues to be in effect; and,
2. The City Council has reconsidered the circumstances of the state of emergency; and,
3. State and local officials continue to recommend measures to promote social distancing to slow the spread of COVID-19.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

Assembly Bill 361 (AB 361) was signed into law by the Governor on September 16, 2021. A portion of AB 361 enacted amendments to California Government Code section 54953 regarding teleconference meetings. Those amendments authorize local agencies, like the City, to continue to conduct meetings by teleconference¹ during a Governor-proclaimed state of emergency² provided that certain findings are made by the legislative body, and provided that certain procedural requirements are met regarding public access to the meetings.

¹ A "teleconference" occurs for purposes of AB 361 whenever one or more members of the City Council connect to a City Council meeting via electronic means. Thus, even if four members of the City Council meet in person, if the fifth joins the meeting via Zoom, the meeting will be a teleconference meeting that must be conducted in accordance with the requirements of AB 361.

² For purposes of AB 361 "...'state of emergency' means a state of emergency proclaimed pursuant to Section 8625 of the California Emergency Services Act..." Cal. Gov't Code Sec. 54953(e)(4). Section 8265 of CESA in turn refers to a state of emergency proclaimed by the Governor

A new requirement in AB 361 requires specific findings be reaffirmed at least every thirty (30) days in order for the City Council to continue to have the option for one (1) or more of its members to use teleconferencing.

The Required Findings

The teleconference provisions in AB 361 may only be utilized as long as a Governor-proclaimed state of emergency remains active, or while state or local officials have recommended measures to promote social distancing. When either of those is the case (both are true at this time), then in order to continue to teleconference using the new provisions of AB 361, the City Council must make the following findings by majority vote every 30 days:

(A) The City Council has reconsidered the circumstances of the state of emergency; and

(B) Either of the following circumstances exist:

- (i) The state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of the members to meet safely in person; or
- (ii) State or local officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing³.

To comply with that requirement, the recommended action would have the City Council find each of the following:

1. A state of emergency has been proclaimed by California's Governor due to the COVID-19 pandemic, and continues to be in effect; and,
2. The City Council has reconsidered the circumstances of the state of emergency; and,
3. State and local officials continue to recommend measures to promote social distancing to slow the spread of COVID-19.

The "Every 30 Days Thereafter" Requirement

As noted above, AB 361 findings must be made "no later than 30 days after teleconferencing for the first time pursuant to [AB 361], and every 30 days thereafter..."

In order to preserve the option for the City Council or individual members of the City Council to participate in meetings during the pandemic via teleconference in the future, the City Council will have to adopt the required findings at least every 30 days.

Potential Consequence of Not Making the Findings Every 30 Days

AB 361 does not expressly state what happens if a legislative body fails to make the required findings "every 30 days." However, it expressly requires the timely re-approval of the findings "in order to continue to teleconference" in the manner that AB 361 authorizes.

³ Cal Gov't Code Sec. 54953(e)(3)

As a result, if the City Council does not adopt the required findings every 30 days, then the City Council could be precluded from continuing to teleconference thereafter, perhaps even if the City Council was willing to adopt the findings at a later date. For this reason, the City Attorney recommends that the City Council adopt the required findings at this time and at least every 30 days thereafter, unless the City Council decides as a permanent matter that it will no longer permit teleconferencing at all (e.g., regardless of whether the state of emergency worsens).

Procedural Requirements for The Conduct of Teleconference Meetings

AB 361 contains several new requirements for the conduct of teleconference meetings with which the City has prepared to comply. Specifically, each meeting must:

1. Allow members of the public to attend and comment at the meeting via call-in option or internet-based service option; and,
2. Protect the statutory and constitutional rights of the parties and the public appearing before the legislative body; and,
3. In the event of disruption which prevents broadcasting the meeting or which prevents members of the public from offering public comments via the call-in or internet-based option, the City Council must take no further action until the disrupted public access is restored; and,
4. The City may not require public comments to be submitted in advance, and must offer the opportunity for the public to offer comments “in real time” during the meeting; and,
5. The public must be allowed “a reasonable amount of time per agenda item to allow members of the public to provide public comment, including time for members of the public to register [to log into the teleconference], or otherwise be recognized for the purpose of providing public comment.

SUMMARY

This report outlines the personnel change for the Administration Department, City Manager's Office.

RECOMMENDATION

1. Adopt Resolution No. 2022-09, entitled, "A RESOLUTION OF CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOS ALAMITOS, CALIFORNIA, ADOPTING A JOB DESCRIPTION FOR MANAGEMENT ANALYST"; and,
2. Adopt Resolution No. 2022-10, entitled, "A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOS ALAMITOS, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING THE SALARIES AND BENEFITS FOR NON-REPRESENTED EMPLOYEES TO INCLUDE MANAGEMENT ANALYST"; and,
3. Approve a budget amendment for Fiscal Year 2021-2022 in the Administration Department for an additional \$32,260 for a full-time Management Analyst position.

BACKGROUND

As part of the city wide personnel changes, the City Manager's Office identified personnel changes that are desired to maintain services and increase City wide efficiency. This report outlines the proposed implementation of a full-time Management Analyst position.

The Administration Department is in need of administrative support to work at optimal level. The Management Analyst will offer administrative support to the City Manager, Administrative Services Manager, and City Clerk.

DISCUSSION

The full-time Management Analyst will report to the City Manager's office, perform administrative, financial, human resources, statistical and other management analyses in support of departmental or City-wide activities. This person will also assist in the development and review of policies, procedures, work methods, budget development and implementation, and perform related professional and administrative duties as assigned, including without limitation: taking the lead on special projects of organizational-wide significance; conducting studies; making recommendations; implementing programs; analyzing legislation; identifying potential organizational impacts; preparing technical reports; developing and implementing City policy processes and programs to meet legislative requirements; and communicating changes to the organization.

Resolution No. 2022-09 seeks to approve the job description for the Management Analyst. Working closely with confidential information from the Human Resources department and City Manager's office, Staff recommends adding the Management Analyst position to the Non-Represented Confidential Employee Group. This position was not previously included in Non-Represented Employees Resolution. There are no proposed changes to any of the terms and conditions of employment for the Non-Represented Employees previously approved in Resolution 2021-25. The job description and respective salary schedules are included.

FISCAL IMPACT

The fiscal impact for FY 2021-2022 would be approximately \$25,834 (assuming 3 month remaining of FY 2021-2022) which includes the associated increase in benefit-related costs for the full-time Management Analyst. Funding for this position is available within the currently allocated budget and does not require a budget adjustment at this time. The total annual cost for the Budget Analyst, including benefits, is \$103,3377, and will be included in the Fiscal Year 2022-23 Budget.

SUMMARY

The work for the Cerritos Avenue Guardrail Repair Project (CIP No. 20/21-04) has been completed. The work included repair of the damaged Cerritos Avenue Bridge guardrail.

Staff is recommending City Council accept the project as completed, direct filing of the Notice of Completion (NOC), and authorize retention release as prescribed by the Public Contracts Codes.

RECOMMENDATION

1. Accept as complete the construction by Peterson-Chase General Engineering Construction, Inc. for the Cerritos Avenue Guardrail Repair Project (CIP No. 20/21-04); and,
2. Direct the City Clerk to record the Notice of Completion/Final Report with the County Recorder's Office; and,
3. Authorize Staff to release the 5% retention to the contractor, in the amount of \$2,213.00 thirty-five (35) days after recordation of the Notice of Completion.

BACKGROUND

The guard rail located in the westbound direction at the Cerritos Avenue Bridge was damaged by a motorist. The City repaired the damaged guardrail by contracting out with Peterson-Chase General Engineering Construction, Inc.

DISCUSSION

Work on this project is now complete and found acceptable by the City Engineer and Public Works staff. Staff recommends acceptance of the work in conjunction with the processing of the Notice of Completion/Final Report and release of the retention as prescribed by the Public Contracts Codes.

FISCAL IMPACT

The project had a total budget of \$72,816.00. Funding for this project is as follows:

- \$37,279.73 came from the Insurance Claim
- \$35,536.27 from Measure M

The total project cost was \$69,608.00, leaving a surplus of \$3,208.00. Thus, the project came in within the approved budget.

SUMMARY

Pursuant to Elections Code section 21601, cities with by-district election systems are required to redraw their district boundary maps following each decennial federal census to ensure compliance with the California and federal Voting Rights Acts. The process to complete the redistricting requires a minimum of four public hearings and dedicated public outreach to ensure minority populations and communities of interest are aware of the redistricting effort and are provided with options to participate. The deadline for cities to complete the redistricting process is April 17, 2022. This Public Hearing was continued from March 7, 2022.

RECOMMENDATION

1. Reopen the public hearing to receive public input on district boundaries; and,
2. Select a preferred District Boundary Map; and,
3. Introduce, waive reading in full and authorize reading by title only of Ordinance No. 2022-01, and set for adoption; and,
4. City Attorney Daudt read the title of Ordinance No. 2022-01, entitled, "An ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOS ALAMITOS, CALIFORNIA, ADOPTING DISTRICT MAPS FOR THE CITY OF LOS ALAMITOS BY-DISTRICT ELECTIONS ."

BACKGROUND

On May 11, 2018, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2018-08 declaring its intent to initiate proceedings to transition the City from at-large to district-based Council Member

elections pursuant to Elections Code Section 10010 and Government Code Section 34886. The City Council subsequently held five public hearings to solicit feedback and review City Council district maps submitted by the public. On July 16, 2018, the City Council introduced and on July 30, 2018, adopted Ordinance 2018-05, selecting a preferred map and election sequence for the newly created City Council District boundaries (“Districting Ordinance”).

Following the early resignation of a Council Member Warren Kusumoto, Ordinance No. 2020-02 was adopted to amend the Districting Ordinance to provide for the election of three Councilmembers by district in 2020, with two Councilmembers elected by district in 2022.

After the transition to the district-based election system, the City was geographically divided into five separate districts, each represented by one Council Member who was chosen by the electors residing in that particular district.

On May 17, 2021, the City Council approved an agreement with National Demographics Corporation, Inc. for Professional Demographer Services to assist in facilitating City Council District Map revisions.

The districts must now be redrawn using the 2020 census data and in compliance with the Fair Maps Act (the “Act”), which was adopted by the California legislature as AB 849 and took effect January 1, 2020. The deadline for cities with November elections to adopt the final District Map is April 17, 2022 (205 days before the election). If this deadline is passed, the County Superior Court will adopt the district boundaries for the City.

Under the Act, the Council shall draw and adopt boundaries using the following criteria in the listed order of priority (Elections Code 21601(c) for general law cities / 21621(c) for charter cities):

- Comply with the federal requirements of equal population and the Voting Rights Act
- Geographically contiguous
- Undivided neighborhoods and “communities of interest” (socio-economic geographic areas that should be kept together)
- Easily identifiable boundaries
- Compact (do not bypass one group of people to get to a more distant group of people)
- Shall not favor or discriminate against a political party

Once the prioritized criteria are met, other traditional districting principles can be considered, such as:

- Minimize the number of voters delayed from voting in 2022 to 2024
- Respect voters’ choices / continuity in office
- Future population growth

The City must ensure compliance with the following state and federally-mandated criteria:

- Each district shall contain a nearly equal population.
- Each district shall be drawn in a manner that complies with the Federal Voting Rights Act.
- Each district shall not be drawn with race as the predominate factor in violation of the principles established by the U.S. Supreme Court in Shaw v. Reno, 509 U.S. 630 (1993), and its progeny.

After meeting those requirements, the idea of districts is to achieve goals including respect for communities of interest. A community of interest is a neighborhood or group that would benefit from being in the same district because of shared interests, views, or characteristics. Possible community features include, but are not limited to:

- A. School attendance areas;
- B. Natural dividing lines such as major roads, hills, or highways;
- C. Areas around parks and other neighborhood landmarks;
- D. Common issues, neighborhood activities, or legislative/election concerns; and
- E. Shared demographic characteristics, such as:
 - a. Similar levels of income, education, or linguistic insolation
 - b. Languages spoken at home
 - c. Single-family and multi-family housing unit areas

Public Hearings

By law, the City must hold at least four public hearings that enable community members to provide input on the drawing of district maps:

- At least one hearing must occur before the city or county draws draft maps
- At least two hearings must happen after the drawing of draft maps
- The fourth hearing can happen either before or after the drawing of draft maps
- City or county staff or consultants may hold a public workshop instead of one of the required public redistricting hearings

To increase the accessibility of these hearings, cities and counties must take the following steps:

- At least one hearing must occur on a Saturday, Sunday, or after 6 p.m. on a weekday
- If a redistricting hearing is consolidated with another local government meeting, the redistricting hearing portion must begin at a pre-designated time
- Local public redistricting hearings should be made accessible to people with disabilities

Notices of the Public Hearings were published in English, Spanish, Korean, and Vietnamese in the local newspaper, posted on the City website, and City Hall posting boards. Videos of the public hearings were posted on the redistricting webpage.

Public Hearing 1 – Tuesday, January 18, 2022 – 5:30 p.m.

This was the first meeting held virtually before the City Council. Dr. Levitt provided the presentation on the redistricting process and this was the first opportunity for the public to provide input. There were no members of the public that wished to participate present and no written public comments were received. Council raised concerns regarding the ability to account for future population growth. A list of known planned and approved developments was provided to NDC for consideration. Concerns regarding the amount of available single-housing units in District 1 were also stated.

Public Hearing 2 – Monday, February 7, 2022 – 5:30 p.m.

This was the second Public Hearing held before the City Council. Dr. Levitt provided the presentation on the redistricting process, and permissible criteria to be considered to evaluate district boundaries. There were no members of the public that wished to participate present and no written public comments were received.

Public Hearing 3 – Monday, February 28, 2022 – 6:30 p.m.

This was the third public hearing held before the City Council. Dr. Levitt provided the presentation on the redistricting process and permissible criteria to be considered to evaluate district boundaries. Dr. Levitt reviewed the four maps for consideration, one draft map submitted by the public and three draft maps prepared by NDC.

Frank Marquese stated support for the work the City was doing and Maggie Marquese received clarification regarding Public Map 1 and NDC Map 1. She stated it would be challenging to split up the Apartment Row neighborhood. Shane Smith identified himself as the individual who submitted the public map. He expressed concern the socioeconomic data was not available on the public map drawing tool and supported participating in the process.

Council discussed the inclusion of Lily and Marna in District one, requested across the street neighbors be in the same district if population balance would allow for it, concern for the lack of single family homes in District 1, ensured new developments were taken into consideration, and stated a preference for not moving residents to a district that would prolong their ability to vote.

Public Hearing 4 – Monday, March 7, 2022 – 6:00 p.m.

This was the fourth public hearing held before the City Council. Dr. Levitt reviewed and discussed the draft maps of proposed districts had been submitted by members of the community and by the City's consultant National Demographics Corporation (NDC).

City Council, Staff, and members of the public discussed the following:

- Strong desire to stay close to original map in order to avoid confusion for residents.
- Try to avoid shifting residents into new districts that may delay their ability to vote in an upcoming election.
- To the extent possible, ensure that neighborhoods stay together.
- Attempt to allow residents on the same block or across the street from each other to remain within the same district (where possible).
- Try to create symmetrical shaped districts boundaries that follow straight lines (where possible) that are easy for residents to identify.
- Ensure district boundaries include different housing types (single family homes, Townhomes, Condo, Apartments).

The City Council directed Dr. Levitt to revise Map 2 based on the comments received and continued the Public Hearing to March 21, 2022, at 7:00 p.m.

Channels of Outreach

The City of Los Alamitos leveraged a full array of outreach platforms to connect with the public. These included:

- The creation of the redistricting page on the City's website, <https://ca-losalamitos.civicplus.com/445/2022-Redistricting>. The webpage contains all notices, flyers, Staff reports, presentations, and meeting recordings. Per the Elections Code the website must be maintained for ten years.

- Email outreach to 10,105 subscribers via the City's Weekly Newsletter to drive awareness of the redistricting effort and opportunities to participate in Public Hearings

- Four Public Hearings, which included one (1) virtual meeting, to discuss the redistricting process and gather public input on neighborhoods and communities of interest

Redistricting Website

The redistricting webpage, <http://cityoflosalamitos.org/445/2022-Redistricting>, was created to provide extensive resources to the public where they could learn about the redistricting process, access all the materials and meeting information, and draw maps based upon their understanding of communities of interest and submit them for consideration.

DISCUSSION

Public Hearing 4 was continued from March 7, 2022. The purpose of this fourth public hearing is to review and discuss draft maps of proposed districts that have been submitted by members of the community and by the City's consultant National Demographics Corporation (NDC). The City Council will be requested to select a preferred map. Direction regarding the final map should not be given prior to opening Public Hearing #4. An Ordinance to adopt the preferred district will be introduced.

Draft Maps

Maps must be population-balanced to be considered for potential adoption. Resident submitted maps and draft maps were posted on the City's website on March 3, 2022. Notice advising draft maps were available was posted on the City's Facebook and Nextdoor.com page.

The public submitted one map. NDC originally created three district sequencing scenarios for consideration by the City Council. Based off Council comments NDC prepared a fourth map from February 28, 2022, and a fifth map from March 7, 2022 for consideration.

Dr. Levitt examined the request to have across the street neighbors in the same district. Due to the dense population in the Apartment Row neighborhood, it was not feasible to do so. Dr. Levitt of NDC will lead a review of the maps and answer questions.

Next Steps

Tonight the City Council will continue Public Hearing #4, select its preferred map, and introduce Ordinance No. 2022-01. Following tonight's Public Hearing, the final map and Ordinance will be adopted at an Adjourned Regular Council meeting on April 11, 2022.

The deadline to adopt a new map is April 17, 2022.

ORDINANCE NO. 2022-01**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOS ALAMITOS, CALIFORNIA, ADOPTING DISTRICT MAPS FOR THE CITY OF LOS ALAMITOS BY-DISTRICT ELECTIONS**

WHEREAS, on July 30, 2018, the City Council of the City of Los Alamitos adopted Ordinance No. 2018-05 establishing a district-based election system for City Councilmembers and selecting a voting district map for five (5) Council Districts; and,

WHEREAS, Elections Code § 21601 requires that following each decennial federal census, and using that census as a basis, the City Council shall, by ordinance or resolution, adjust the boundaries of any or all of the Council Districts so that the districts shall be as nearly equal in population as may be and shall comply with the United States Constitution, the California Constitution, and the state and federal Voting Rights Acts; and,

WHEREAS, Public Hearings were held on January 18, 2022 and February 7, 2022, to receive public input regarding the composition of the City's Council Districts before any updated draft voting district maps were drawn; and,

WHEREAS, Public Hearings were then held on February 28, 2022 and March 7, 2022, where the public was invited to provide input regarding the content of the draft voting district maps; and,

WHEREAS, on March ~~21~~⁷, 2022, the City Council held a final public hearing on the proposal to adjust Council District boundaries, reviewed additional public input, formally selected the voting district map attached hereto as Exhibit A, and incorporated herein, and as set forth in this Ordinance; and,

WHEREAS, this Ordinance is adopted pursuant to Elections Code §§ 21600 - 21609 to provide for election of members of the City Council of the City of Los Alamitos by-district in five (5) single-member districts to implement the purposes of the California Voting Rights Act of 2001 (Elections Code § 14025, et seq.) and protect the guarantees of the California Constitution.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOS ALAMITOS, CALIFORNIA, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The foregoing recitals are true and correct.

SECTION 2. The voting district map attached hereto as Exhibit A shall be and is hereby adopted and determined to constitute the five (5) Council Districts in the City of Los Alamitos, California.

SECTION 3. The City Clerk is authorized to make technical adjustments to the Council District boundaries that do not substantively affect the populations in the districts, the eligibility of candidates, or the residence of elected officials within any district. The City Clerk must consult with the City Manager and City Attorney concerning any technical adjustments deemed necessary and advise the City Council of any such adjustments required in the implementation of the districts.

SECTION 3. If any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance for any reason is held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this Ordinance, and each section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions thereof be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 4. Severability. If any part of this Ordinance or its application is deemed invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the City Council intends that such invalidity will not affect the effectiveness of the remaining provisions or applications and, to this end, the provisions of this Ordinance are severable.

SECTION 5. The City Clerk shall certify as to the adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause a summary thereof to be published within fifteen (15) days of the adoption and shall post a Certified copy of this Ordinance, including the vote for and against the same, in the Office of the City Clerk, in accordance with Government Code Section 36933.









Subject: Public Hearing to Receive Input from the Community Regarding the Redrawing of Election District Boundaries

SUMMARY

Every ten years, cities with by-district election systems must use new census data to review and, if needed, redraw district lines to reflect how local populations have changed. This process, called redistricting, ensures all districts have nearly equal population. The redistricting process for the City of Los Alamitos must be completed by April 17, 2022.

RECOMMENDATION

1. Conduct a public hearing to receive public input on district boundaries; and,
2. Receive a report from Staff on the redistricting process and permissible criteria to be considered to redraw district boundaries.

BACKGROUND

The City adopted its current district boundaries on July 30, 2018, based on 2010 census data as required by law. The districts must now be redrawn using the 2020 census data and in compliance with the FAIR MAPS Act, which was adopted by the California legislature as AB 849 and took effect January 1, 2020.

Under the Act, the Council shall draw and adopt boundaries using the following criteria in the listed order of priority (Elections Code 21601(c) for general law cities / 21621(c) for charter cities):

- Comply with the federal requirements of equal population and the Voting Rights Act
- Geographically contiguous
- Undivided neighborhoods and “communities of interest” (socio-economic geographic areas that should be kept together)

- Easily identifiable boundaries
- Compact (do not bypass one group of people to get to a more distant group of people)
- Shall not favor or discriminate against a political party

Once the prioritized criteria are met, other traditional districting principles can be considered, such as:

- Minimize the number of voters delayed from voting in 2022 to 2024
- Respect voters' choices / continuity in office
- Future population growth

By law, the City must hold at least four public hearings that enable community members to provide input on the drawing of district maps:

- At least one hearing must occur before the city or county draws draft maps
- At least two hearings must happen after the drawing of draft maps
- The fourth hearing can happen either before or after the drawing of draft maps
- City or county staff or consultants may hold a public workshop instead of one of the required public redistricting hearings

To increase the accessibility of these hearings, cities and counties must take the following steps:

- At least one hearing must occur on a Saturday, Sunday, or after 6 p.m. on a weekday
- If a redistricting hearing is consolidated with another local government meeting, the redistricting hearing portion must begin at a pre-designated time
- Local public redistricting hearings should be made accessible to people with disabilities

DISCUSSION

The purpose of this public hearing is to inform the public about the districting process and to hear from the community on what factors should be taken into consideration while creating district boundaries. The public is requested to provide input regarding communities of interest and other local factors that should be considered while drafting district maps.

A community of interest under the relevant Elections Code for cities (Section 21601(c) / 21621(c)) is “a population that shares common social or economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation.”

Possible features defining community of interest might include, but are not limited to:

- School attendance areas;
- Natural dividing lines such as major roads, hills, or highways;
- Areas around parks and other neighborhood landmarks;
- Common issues, neighborhood activities, or legislative/election concerns; and
- Shared demographic characteristics, such as:
 - Similar levels of income, education, or linguistic insolation;
 - Languages spoken at home; and
 - Single-family and multi-family housing unit areas.

Next Steps

On February 7, 2022, the City Council will conduct Public Hearing #2 at a Special meeting to seek additional public input and provide direction on criteria to be considered while drafting district maps. Following that hearing, draft district maps and proposed election sequencing will be posted to the City website and available at City Hall.



Redistricting – Why Now?

- ❑ Los Alamitos moved to districts in 2018 and used districts for first time in 2020
- ❑ Redistricting is required when the decennial Census data is released, once every ten years
- ❑ Delays in receiving the Census data have delayed states, counties, cities, and other jurisdictions throughout California and the US
- ❑ New laws like the Fair Maps Act have changed how districts are drawn and how the process is conducted









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

Subject: Public Hearing #2 to Receive Input from the Community Regarding the Redrawing of Election District Boundaries

SUMMARY

Every ten years, cities with by-district election systems must use new census data to review and, if needed, redraw district lines to reflect how local populations have changed. This process, called redistricting, ensures all districts have nearly equal population. The redistricting process for the City of Los Alamitos must be completed by April 17, 2022.

RECOMMENDATION

1. Conduct a public hearing to receive public input on district boundaries; and,
2. Receive a report from Staff on the redistricting process and permissible criteria to be considered to redraw district boundaries.

BACKGROUND

The City adopted its current district boundaries on July 30, 2018, based on 2010 census data as required by law. The districts must now be redrawn using the 2020 census data and in compliance with the FAIR MAPS Act, which was adopted by the California legislature as AB 849 and took effect January 1, 2020.

Under the Act, the Council shall draw and adopt boundaries using the following criteria in the listed order of priority (Elections Code 21601(c) for general law cities / 21621(c) for charter cities):

- Comply with the federal requirements of equal population and the Voting Rights Act
- Geographically contiguous
- Undivided neighborhoods and “communities of interest” (socio-economic geographic areas that should be kept together)

- Easily identifiable boundaries
- Compact (do not bypass one group of people to get to a more distant group of people)
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Once the prioritized criteria are met, other traditional districting principles can be considered, such as:

- Minimize the number of voters delayed from voting in 2022 to 2024
- Respect voters' choices / continuity in office
- Future population growth

By law, the City must hold at least four public hearings that enable community members to provide input on the drawing of district maps:

- At least one hearing must occur before the city or county draws draft maps
- At least two hearings must happen after the drawing of draft maps
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To increase the accessibility of these hearings, cities and counties must take the following steps:

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DISCUSSION

The purpose of this public hearing is to inform the public about the districting process and to hear from the community on what factors should be taken into consideration while creating district boundaries. The public is requested to provide input regarding communities of interest and other local factors that should be considered while drafting district maps.

A community of interest under the relevant Elections Code for cities (Section 21601(c) / 21621(c)) is “a population that shares common social or economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation.”

Possible features defining community of interest might include, but are not limited to:

- School attendance areas;
- Natural dividing lines such as major roads, hills, or highways;
- Areas around parks and other neighborhood landmarks;
- Common issues, neighborhood activities, or legislative/election concerns; and
- Shared demographic characteristics, such as:
 - Similar levels of income, education, or linguistic insolation;
 - Languages spoken at home; and
 - Single-family and multi-family housing unit areas.

Next Steps

Following tonight's hearing, draft district maps and proposed election sequencing will be posted to the City website and available at City Hall.

Public Hearing 3: Monday, February 28, 2022 – 6:30 p.m. (Regular Council Meeting)

Public Hearing 4: Monday, March 7, 2022 – 6:00 p.m. (Special Council meeting)





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
Neighborhood Map







Subject: Public Hearing #3 to Receive Input on the Draft Revised City Council District Boundaries

SUMMARY

Pursuant to Election Code section 21601, cities with by-district election systems are required to redraw their district boundary maps to ensure compliance with the California and federal Voting Rights Acts. The process to complete the redistricting requires a minimum of four public hearings and dedicated public outreach to ensure minority populations and communities of interest are aware of the redistricting effort and are provided with options to participate. The deadline for cities to complete the redistricting process is April 17, 2022.

RECOMMENDATION

1. Open the public hearing to receive public input on district boundaries; and,
2. Review draft maps to redraw district boundaries and provide input to Staff.

BACKGROUND

On May 11, 2018, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2018-08 declaring its intent to initiate proceedings to transition the City from at-large to district-based Council Member elections pursuant to Elections Code Section 10010 and Government Code Section 34886. The City Council subsequently held five public hearings to solicit feedback and review City Council district maps submitted by the public. On July 16, 2018, the City Council introduced and on July 30, 2018, adopted Ordinance 2018-05, with the Green for the newly created City Council District boundaries.

Following the early resignation of a Council Member, Ordinance No. 2020-02 was adopted to amend the Districting Ordinance to provide for the election of three Councilmembers by district in 2020, with two Councilmembers elected by district in 2022.

After the transition to the district-based election system, the city was geographically divided into five separate districts, each represented by one Council Member who was chosen by the electors residing in that particular district.

On May 17, 2021, the City Council approved an agreement with National Demographics Corporation, Inc. for Professional Demographer Services to assist in facilitating City Council District Map revisions.

The districts must now be redrawn using the 2020 census data and in compliance with the FAIR MAPS Act, which was adopted by the California legislature as AB 849 and took effect January 1, 2020. The deadline for cities with November elections to adopt the final District Map is April 17, 2022 (205 days before the election). If this deadline is passed, the County Superior Court will adopt the district boundaries for the city.

Under the Act, the Council shall draw and adopt boundaries using the following criteria in the listed order of priority (Elections Code 21601(c) for general law cities / 21621(c) for charter cities):

- Comply with the federal requirements of equal population and the Voting Rights Act
- Geographically contiguous
- Undivided neighborhoods and “communities of interest” (socio-economic geographic areas that should be kept together)
- Easily identifiable boundaries
- Compact (do not bypass one group of people to get to a more distant group of people)
- Shall not favor or discriminate against a political party

Once the prioritized criteria are met, other traditional districting principles can be considered, such as:

- Minimize the number of voters delayed from voting in 2022 to 2024
- Respect voters’ choices / continuity in office
- Future population growth

The City must ensure compliance with the following state and federally-mandated criteria:

- Each district shall contain a nearly equal population.
- Each district shall be drawn in a manner that complies with the Federal Voting Rights Act.
- Each district shall not be drawn with race as the predominate factor in violation of the principles established by the U.S. Supreme Court in Shaw v. Reno, 509 U.S. 630 (1993), and its progeny.

After meeting those requirements, the idea of districts is to achieve goals including respect for communities of interest. A community of interest is a neighborhood or group that would benefit from being in the same district because of shared interests, views, or characteristics. Possible community features include, but are not limited to:

- A. School attendance areas;
- B. Natural dividing lines such as major roads, hills, or highways;
- C. Areas around parks and other neighborhood landmarks;
- D. Common issues, neighborhood activities, or legislative/election concerns; and
- E. Shared demographic characteristics, such as:
 - a. Similar levels of income, education, or linguistic insolation
 - b. Languages spoken at home
 - c. Single-family and multi-family housing unit areas

Public Hearings

By law, the City must hold at least four public hearings that enable community members to provide input on the drawing of district maps:

- At least one hearing must occur before the city or county draws draft maps
- At least two hearings must happen after the drawing of draft maps
- The fourth hearing can happen either before or after the drawing of draft maps
- City or county staff or consultants may hold a public workshop instead of one of the required public redistricting hearings

To increase the accessibility of these hearings, cities and counties must take the following steps:

- At least one hearing must occur on a Saturday, Sunday, or after 6 p.m. on a weekday
- If a redistricting hearing is consolidated with another local government meeting, the redistricting hearing portion must begin at a pre-designated time
- Local public redistricting hearings should be made accessible to people with disabilities

On January 18, 2022, and February 7, 2022, the City Council held the first and second of its four required public hearings in the redistricting process, taking input from the public and providing feedback to NDC. This is the third of the four public hearings required by the FAIR MAPS Act.

The fourth public hearing is scheduled for a Special City Council meeting of March 7, 2022 at 6:00 p.m., at which time the City Council is expected to identify and introduce an ordinance to adopt its preferred map. That ordinance would then be adopted at the City Council's Regular meeting to be held on March 21, 2022.

Community Outreach

The City has engaged in outreach efforts to inform the public about the process to redraw the district elections lines. The Public Hearing Notice for the hearings was published in English, Spanish, Korean, and Vietnamese in the News Enterprise. The notices were posted on the City's website, on the posting board at City Hall, and posted to the City's social media outlets including Facebook, Twitter, and Nextdoor.com.

The City's website, <https://ca-losalamitos.civicplus.com/445/2022-Redistricting>, contains all notices, flyers, Staff reports, presentations, and meeting recordings. Before each public hearing an additional notice is published to the City's Social Media sites. The information has also been included in the City's Weekly newsletter.

DISCUSSION

The purpose of this third public hearing is to review and discuss draft maps of proposed districts that have been submitted by members of the community and by the City's consultant National Demographics Corporation (NDC). This hearing transitions from the earlier hearings' purpose of informing the public about the districting process and hearing from the community on what factors should be taken into consideration while creating district boundaries, to a new focus on the specific boundary lines of the draft maps.

Draft Maps

Maps must be population-balanced to be considered for potential adoption. Resident submitted maps and draft maps were posted on the City's website on February 21, 2022. Notice advising draft maps were available was posted on the City's Facebook and Nextdoor.com page and sent to the local papers.

The public submitted one map. NDC has created three district sequencing scenarios for review by the City Council and the public. A representative from NDC will lead a review of the draft maps and answer questions. Part of this process will include looking at different scenarios and various ways to divide the districts.

Based on comments received at or in advance of the third Public Hearing, NDC will refine the proposed maps for final consideration during the fourth Public Hearing on March 7, 2022.

Received Comments

At the January 18, 2022 Public Hearing, Council raised concerns regarding the ability to account for future population growth. A list of known planned and approved developments has been provided to NDC for consideration.

At the same Hearing, concerns were stated regarding the amount of available single-housing units in District 1.

No comments were received at Public Hearing #2.

Next Steps

Tonight the City Council will conduct Public Hearing #3 to seek public input and provide direction on the redrawn draft district maps. Topics for discussion can include:

- How well do the draft maps comply with the Fair Maps Act?
- What do you like about (parts of) each map? What works in each option?
- Council may eliminate maps, request additional maps or tests, and provide additional direction to the demographer

Following tonight's Public Hearing, the initial draft maps and any possible new or revised maps will be discussed at the Public Hearing #4 on March 7, 2022.

On March 7, 2022, Public Hearing #4, the City Council will be requested to select a preferred map. Direction regarding the final map should not be given prior to opening Public Hearing #4. An Ordinance to adopt the preferred district will be introduced.

Adoption of the Ordinance is scheduled to occur on March 21, 2022, and the City Clerk and demographer will then work with the County Elections Division to have the district maps integrated into the countywide voting system. This adoption meets the April 17, 2022 deadline and the new district boundaries will be effective for the November 8, 2022 General Municipal Election.















Subject: Public Hearing #4 to Receive Input on the Draft Revised City Council District Boundaries and Select a Preferred District Boundary Map

SUMMARY

Pursuant to Elections Code section 21601, cities with by-district election systems are required to redraw their district boundary maps following each decennial federal census to ensure compliance with the California and federal Voting Rights Acts. The process to complete the redistricting requires a minimum of four public hearings and dedicated public outreach to ensure minority populations and communities of interest are aware of the redistricting effort and are provided with options to participate. The deadline for cities to complete the redistricting process is April 17, 2022.

RECOMMENDATION

1. Open the public hearing to receive public input on district boundaries; and,
2. Select a preferred District Boundary Map; and,
3. Introduce, waive reading in full and authorize reading by title only of Ordinance No. 2022-01, and set for adoption; and,
4. City Attorney Daudt read the title of Ordinance No. 2022-01, entitled, "An ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOS ALAMITOS, CALIFORNIA, ADOPTING DISTRICT MAPS FOR THE CITY OF LOS ALAMITOS BY-DISTRICT ELECTIONS ."

BACKGROUND

On May 11, 2018, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2018-08 declaring its intent to initiate proceedings to transition the City from at-large to district-based Council Member elections pursuant to Elections Code Section 10010 and Government Code Section

34886. The City Council subsequently held five public hearings to solicit feedback and review City Council district maps submitted by the public. On July 16, 2018, the City Council introduced and on July 30, 2018, adopted Ordinance 2018-05, selecting a preferred map and election sequence for the newly created City Council District boundaries (“Districting Ordinance”).

Following the early resignation of a Council Member Warren Kusumoto, Ordinance No. 2020-02 was adopted to amend the Districting Ordinance to provide for the election of three Councilmembers by district in 2020, with two Councilmembers elected by district in 2022.

After the transition to the district-based election system, the City was geographically divided into five separate districts, each represented by one Council Member who was chosen by the electors residing in that particular district.

On May 17, 2021, the City Council approved an agreement with National Demographics Corporation, Inc. for Professional Demographer Services to assist in facilitating City Council District Map revisions.

The districts must now be redrawn using the 2020 census data and in compliance with the Fair Maps Act (the “Act”), which was adopted by the California legislature as AB 849 and took effect January 1, 2020. The deadline for cities with November elections to adopt the final District Map is April 17, 2022 (205 days before the election). If this deadline is passed, the County Superior Court will adopt the district boundaries for the City.

Under the Act, the Council shall draw and adopt boundaries using the following criteria in the listed order of priority (Elections Code 21601(c) for general law cities / 21621(c) for charter cities):

- Comply with the federal requirements of equal population and the Voting Rights Act
- Geographically contiguous
- Undivided neighborhoods and “communities of interest” (socio-economic geographic areas that should be kept together)
- Easily identifiable boundaries
- Compact (do not bypass one group of people to get to a more distant group of people)
- Shall not favor or discriminate against a political party

Once the prioritized criteria are met, other traditional districting principles can be considered, such as:

- Minimize the number of voters delayed from voting in 2022 to 2024
- Respect voters’ choices / continuity in office
- Future population growth

The City must ensure compliance with the following state and federally-mandated criteria:

- Each district shall contain a nearly equal population.
- Each district shall be drawn in a manner that complies with the Federal Voting Rights Act.
- Each district shall not be drawn with race as the predominate factor in violation of the principles established by the U.S. Supreme Court in Shaw v. Reno, 509 U.S. 630 (1993), and its progeny.

After meeting those requirements, the idea of districts is to achieve goals including respect for communities of interest. A community of interest is a neighborhood or group that would benefit from being in the same district because of shared interests, views, or characteristics. Possible community features include, but are not limited to:

- A. School attendance areas;
- B. Natural dividing lines such as major roads, hills, or highways;
- C. Areas around parks and other neighborhood landmarks;
- D. Common issues, neighborhood activities, or legislative/election concerns; and
- E. Shared demographic characteristics, such as:
 - a. Similar levels of income, education, or linguistic insolation
 - b. Languages spoken at home
 - c. Single-family and multi-family housing unit areas

Public Hearings

By law, the City must hold at least four public hearings that enable community members to provide input on the drawing of district maps:

- At least one hearing must occur before the city or county draws draft maps
- At least two hearings must happen after the drawing of draft maps
- The fourth hearing can happen either before or after the drawing of draft maps
- City or county staff or consultants may hold a public workshop instead of one of the required public redistricting hearings

To increase the accessibility of these hearings, cities and counties must take the following steps:

- At least one hearing must occur on a Saturday, Sunday, or after 6 p.m. on a weekday
- If a redistricting hearing is consolidated with another local government meeting, the redistricting hearing portion must begin at a pre-designated time
- Local public redistricting hearings should be made accessible to people with disabilities

Notices of the Public Hearings were published in English, Spanish, Korean, and Vietnamese in the local newspaper, posted on the City website, and City Hall posting boards. Videos of the public hearings were posted on the redistricting webpage.

Public Hearing 1 – Tuesday, January 18, 2022 – 5:30 p.m.

This was the first meeting held virtually before the City Council. Dr. Levitt provided the presentation on the redistricting process and this was the first opportunity for the public to provide input. There were no members of the public that wished to participate present and no written public comments were received. Council raised concerns regarding the ability to account for future population growth. A list of known planned and approved developments was provided to NDC for consideration. Concerns regarding the amount of available single-housing units in District 1 were also stated.

Public Hearing 2 – Monday, February 7, 2022 – 5:30 p.m.

This was the second Public Hearing held before the City Council. Dr. Levitt provided the presentation on the redistricting process, and permissible criteria to be considered to evaluate district boundaries. There were no members of the public that wished to participate present and no written public comments were received.

Public Hearing 3 – Monday, February 28, 2022 – 6:30 p.m.

This was the third public hearing held before the City Council. Dr. Levitt provided the presentation on the redistricting process and permissible criteria to be considered to evaluate district boundaries. Dr. Levitt reviewed the four maps for consideration, one draft map submitted by the public and three draft maps prepared by NDC.

Frank Marquese stated support for the work the City was doing and. Maggie Marquese received clarification regarding Public Map 1 and NDC Map 1. She stated it would be challenging to split up the Apartment Row neighborhood. Shane Smith identified himself as the individual who submitted the public map. He expressed concern the socioeconomic data was not available on the public map drawing tool and supported participating in the process.

Council discussed the inclusion of Lily and Marna in District one, requested across the street neighbors be in the same district if population balance would allow for it, concern for the lack of single family homes in District 1, ensured new developments were taken into consideration, and stated a preference for not moving residents to a district that would prolong their ability to vote.

Channels of Outreach

The City of Los Alamitos leveraged a full array of outreach platforms to connect with the public. These included:

- The creation of the redistricting page on the City's website, <https://ca-losalamitos.civicplus.com/445/2022-Redistricting>. The webpage contains all notices, flyers, Staff reports, presentations, and meeting recordings. Per the Elections Code the website must be maintained for ten years.

- Social Media posts spread across Facebook, Twitter, and Nextdoor.com.
 - 1/10/22 – Introduction of the process and notice of first Public Hearing
 - 1/18/22 – Reminder to join the first Public Hearing
 - 1/27/22 – Requesting input for maps and notice of second Public Hearing
 - 2/7/22 – Notice of Public Hearing available on the City’s website
 - 2/14/22 – Notice Redistricting Map Tools available Online and third Public Hearing
 - 2/21/22 – Notice of Map Drafts available online and third Public Hearing
 - 3/3/22 – Notice of Final Map selection and fourth Public Hearing
 - 3/7/22 – Reminder of fourth Public Hearing

- Public Hearing Notices in English, Spanish, Korean, and Vietnamese were published in the News Enterprise on January 12 and February 2, 2012

- Email outreach to 10,105 subscribers via the City’s Weekly Newsletter to drive awareness of the redistricting effort and opportunities to participate in Public Hearings

- Four Public Hearings, which included one (1) virtual meeting, to discuss the redistricting process and gather public input on neighborhoods and communities of interest

Redistricting Website

The redistricting webpage, <http://cityoflosalamitos.org/445/2022-Redistricting>, was created to provide extensive resources to the public where they could learn about the redistricting process, access all the materials and meeting information, and draw maps based upon their understanding of communities of interest and submit them for consideration.

DISCUSSION

The purpose of this fourth public hearing is to review and discuss draft maps of proposed districts that have been submitted by members of the community and by the City’s consultant National Demographics Corporation (NDC). The City Council will be requested to select a preferred map. Direction regarding the final map should not be given prior to opening Public Hearing #4. An Ordinance to adopt the preferred district will be introduced.

Draft Maps

Maps must be population-balanced to be considered for potential adoption. Resident submitted maps and draft maps were posted on the City’s website on March 3, 2022. Notice advising draft maps were available was posted on the City’s Facebook and Nextdoor.com page.

The public submitted one map. NDC originally created three district sequencing scenarios for consideration by the City Council. Based off Council comments from February 28, 2022, NDC has prepared a fourth map for consideration.

Dr. Levitt examined the request to have across the street neighbors in the same district. Due to the dense population in the Apartment Row neighborhood, it was not feasible to do so. Dr. Levitt of NDC will lead a review of the maps and answer questions.

Next Steps

Tonight the City Council will conduct Public Hearing #4, select its preferred map, and introduce Ordinance No. 2022-01. Following tonight's Public Hearing, the final map and Ordinance will be adopted at the March 21, 2022 Council meeting.

The deadline to adopt a new map is April 17, 2022. If Council is not able to select a preferred map and/or requests additional changes this evening, the Public Hearing needs to be continued to a date certain. This will to allow time for further consideration and ensure compliance with all legal requirements.









ORDINANCE NO. 2018-05

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOS ALAMITOS, CALIFORNIA, ESTABLISHING A DISTRICT-BASED ELECTION SYSTEM FOR MEMBERS OF THE CITY COUNCIL

WHEREAS, members of the City Council of the City of Los Alamitos are currently elected in at-large elections, in which each City Councilmember is elected by voters of the entire City; and

WHEREAS, on March 29, 2018, the City received a certified letter from attorney Kevin Shenkman of the law firm of Shenkman & Hughes asserting that the City's at-large Councilmember election system violates the California Voting Rights Act ("CVRA") and threatening litigation if the City declines to voluntarily change to a district-based election system where each City Councilmember resides within a designated district boundary and is elected only by the voters in that district; and

WHEREAS, the City denies its current at-large election system violates the CVRA or any other provision of law and asserts the City's election system is legal in all respects and further denies any wrongdoing whatsoever regarding the way it has conducted its City Council elections; and

WHEREAS, while the City Council strongly believes that the interests of all of the City's residents have been fully and fairly represented under the City's current at-large election system, the City Council has concluded it is in the public interest to transition to district-based elections due to the uncertainty of litigation to defend against a CVRA lawsuit and the potentially extraordinary cost of such a lawsuit, even if the City were to prevail; and

WHEREAS, on May 11, 2018, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2018-08, declaring the City's intention to transition from at-large to district-based elections pursuant to California Elections Code Section 10010; and

WHEREAS, the City retained an expert demographer to assist the City with the process of analyzing the City's population, developing draft district maps consistent with the CVRA and the Federal Voting Rights Act, and gathering input from residents on the potential Council district maps; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with California Elections Code Section 10010(a)(1), the City Council held two public hearings on May 29, 2018 and June 4, 2018 where the public was invited to provide input regarding the composition of the City's voting districts before any draft maps were drawn; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with California Elections Code Section 10010(a)(2), the

City Council held two additional public hearings on June 18, 2018 and July 9, 2018 where the public was invited to provide input regarding the content of the draft maps and the proposed sequence of elections; and

WHEREAS, at its July 9, 2018 meeting, the City Council selected its preferred district map, determined its preferred sequence of district elections, and directed staff to bring forward this Ordinance for its consideration; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with California Government Code Section 34886, it is declared that the change in the method of electing members of the City Council of the City of Los Alamitos made by this Ordinance is in furtherance of the purposes of the California Voting Rights Act of 2001 (Chapter 1.5 (commencing with Section 14025) of Division 14 of the Elections Code) and to implement the guarantees of Section 7 of Article I and Section 2 of Article II of the California Constitution.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOS ALAMITOS, CALIFORNIA, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The foregoing recitals are true and correct.

SECTION 2. Establishment of a District-Based Election System.

A. By-District Elections. Pursuant to California Government Code Section 34886, beginning in November 2020 and upon the expiration of the current terms of office of members of the City Council, City Councilmembers shall be elected by the five Council districts established by subdivision (B) of this Section. Elections shall take place “by-district” as that term is defined in California Government Code Section 34871, meaning one City Councilmember shall be elected from each district by the voters of that district alone.

B. Council Districts. All five Councilmembers shall be elected on a “by-district” basis from the Council districts shown and numbered on the district map attached hereto as Exhibit A, and incorporated herein by reference, a copy of which shall be on file in the City Clerk’s office.

C. Sequence of Elections. Commencing with the November 2020 General Municipal Election, and every four years thereafter, the following two Council districts shall be elected by-district: District 1 and District 3. Commencing with the November 2022 General Municipal Election, and every four years thereafter, the following three Council districts shall be elected by-district: District 2; District 4; and District 5.

D. Residency in Council District Required. A Councilmember elected or appointed to represent a Council district must reside in that district and be a registered voter in that district, and any candidate for City Council must reside in, and be a registered voter in, the Council district in which he or she seeks election at the time nomination papers are issued. Termination of residency in a Council district by a Councilmember

shall create an immediate vacancy for that district unless a substitute residence within the district is established within thirty (30) days after the termination of residency.

E. Expiration of At-Large Terms of Office. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Section, the Councilmembers in office prior to the November 2020 General Municipal Election shall continue in office until the expiration of the term to which he or she was elected. In the event a vacancy occurs before the expiration of the term of a Councilmember in office prior to the November 2020 General Municipal Election, a person who is appointed or elected in accordance with Section 502 of the Los Alamitos City Charter to fill such vacancy may reside anywhere within the corporate boundaries of the City.

SECTION 3. If necessary to facilitate the implementation of this Ordinance as determined by the County Registrar of Voters, the City Clerk is authorized to make technical adjustments to the Council district boundaries that do not substantively affect the populations in the districts, the eligibility of candidates, or the residence of elected officials within any district. The City Clerk shall consult with the City Manager and City Attorney concerning any technical adjustments deemed necessary and shall advise the City Council of any such adjustments required in the implementation of the districts.


SECTION 4. If any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance for any reason is held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this Ordinance, and each section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions thereof be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 5. The City Clerk shall certify as to the adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause a summary thereof to be published within fifteen (15) days of the adoption and shall post a Certified copy of this Ordinance, including the vote for and against the same, in the Office of the City Clerk, in accordance with Government Code Section 36933.



ORDINANCE NO. 2020-02

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOS ALAMITOS, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 2018-05 TO REVISE THE SEQUENCE OF DISTRICT ELECTIONS

WHEREAS, on July 30, 2018, the City Council of the City of Los Alamitos adopted Ordinance No. 2018-05 establishing a district-based election system for City Councilmembers; and,

WHEREAS, per Ordinance No. 2018-05, commencing with the November 2020 General Municipal Election, City Councilmembers shall be elected “by-district” from the five Council districts shown and numbered on the district map attached hereto as Exhibit “A”, and incorporated herein by reference; and,

WHEREAS, per Ordinance No. 2018-05, two Councilmembers will be elected from District 1, and District 3 in November 2020; three Councilmembers will be elected from District 2, District 4, and District 5 in November 2022; and,

WHEREAS, on December 16, 2019, Councilmember Warren Kusumoto resigned from his position on the City Council creating a vacant seat (“Council Vacancy”); and,

WHEREAS, on December 21, 2019, the City Council voted to fill the Council Vacancy by appointment in accordance with Section 502 of Article V. of the Los Alamitos Charter; and,

WHEREAS, on January 14, 2020, the City Council interviewed candidates and voted to appoint Tanya Doby to fill the Council Vacancy; and,

WHEREAS, Councilmember Doby shall serve until the next General Municipal Election in November 2020; and,

WHEREAS, because Councilmember Warren Kusumoto was elected at-large in 2018 for a four-year term ending in 2022, and because Doby’s term will lapse in 2020, absent an amendment to Ordinance No. 2018-05, an at-large election in 2020 would be necessary to fill the the remaining two-year term resulting from the Council Vacancy; and,

WHEREAS, to advance the transition from at-large to by-district elections in the City of Los Alamitos, and in furtherance of the purposes of the California Voting Rights Act of 2001 (Chapter 1.5 (commencing with Section 14025) of Division 14 of the Elections Code), the City Council desires to amend Ordinance 2018-05 to provide for the election of three, rather than two, Councilmembers by-district in November 2020.


C. Sequence of Elections. Commencing with the November 2020 General Municipal Election, and every four years thereafter, the following three ~~two~~ Council districts shall be elected by-district: District 1, District 2, and District 3. Commencing with the November 2022 General Municipal Election, and every four years thereafter, the following two ~~three~~ Council districts shall be elected by-district: ~~District 2;~~ District 4; and District 5.

SECTION 3. Except as expressly modified above, Ordinance No. 2018-05 shall remain unchanged and in full force and effect.


SECTION 4. If any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance for any reason is held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this Ordinance, and each section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions thereof be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 5. The City Clerk shall certify as to the adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause a summary thereof to be published within fifteen (15) days of the adoption and shall post a Certified copy of this Ordinance, including the vote for and against the same, in the Office of the City Clerk, in accordance with Government Code Section 36933.





**Subject: Mid-Year General Fund Budget Review and Financial Update
for Fiscal Year 2021-22**

SUMMARY

This report provides a review of Mid-Year General Fund budget for the Fiscal Year 2021-22 and a projection for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022.

RECOMMENDATION

1. Review the Mid-year General Fund budget for the Fiscal Year 2021-22, and projection for the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 2022; and,
2. Provide direction and comments.

BACKGROUND

On June 21, 2021, the City Council approved and adopted a balanced budget for Fiscal Year 2021-22, which included operating revenues of \$18,393,865 and operating expenditures of \$16,646,847, excluding transfers.

On January 25, 2022, the Budget Standing Committee received early preliminary projections for Fiscal Year 2021-22 that indicated a surplus primarily from departmental savings. Since that meeting, a new sales forecast has been received from HdL. Staff has also been working with the departments to receive updated information in connection with projections of additional requested line-item expenditures.

On March 9, 2022, the Budget Standing Committee received the Mid-Year General Fund Budget for Fiscal Year 2021-22 and projections for the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 2022. This report reflects the most updated information.

DISCUSSION

The economy as a whole is recovering since the outbreak and spread of the COVID-19 pandemic. Economic activity has shown signs of rebounding as reflected in housing sales, durable goods orders, and consumer spending. According to a recent economic forecast by Beacon Economics and UC Riverside Center for Economic Forecasting and Development, the U.S. economy is rebounding and is not the same economy it was a year and a half ago. Structurally, portions of the economy that were materially impacted by the pandemic have yet to see a full return. Consumer spending on services including healthcare, recreation, travel, and hospitality remains 3% below where it was before the pandemic. Business investment in non-residential structures also remains depressed, as well as U.S. exports. But weaknesses in these sectors have been more than offset by stronger than normal levels of activity in other sectors of the economy, including consumer spending on goods, a robust housing market, and business investment in equipment and software.

The fiscal and monetary policy response in the United States to the COVID crisis was unprecedented in terms of its scale, scope, and speed. Legislation passed by the Congress in March 2020, December 2020, and March 2021, provided a total of nearly \$5.8 trillion in fiscal support to the U.S. economy, representing approximately 28% of the total U.S. GDP. Los Alamitos has benefited directly and was a recipient of \$2.7 million from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding and received \$513 thousand in Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES) funding. This stimulus funding will be used for authorized expenditures as defined under the ARPA and CARES Act funding guidelines.

However, as the economy shifts to full recovery, concerns over inflation are mounting. In a recent report from HdL, dated January 26, 2022, prices are growing but are now outpacing the rate of sales. Projections for year-over-year growth are 11.5% for FY21-22, however slower growth is projected for FY22-23 and FY23-24.

This mid-year report represents a snapshot in time and reflects recorded information through December 31, 2021, or six months of the fiscal year, and projection of Fiscal Year 2021-22. It will provide the Budget Standing Committee and City Council with an update on the financial status of the City's General Fund at mid-year, and projection of Fiscal Year 2021-22.

General Fund Revenues

The financial summary below depicts the Adopted Budget for Fiscal Year 2021-22, actual General Fund revenues through December 31, 2021 and a projection to June 30, 2022.

Property Taxes, Sales and Use Taxes, and Measure Y Local Sales Taxes, are the three largest revenue sources for Los Alamitos, and comprise approximately 68% of all revenue generated and collected by the City.

Property Taxes

Property taxes remain one of the largest revenue sources for the City and the majority are received in December and April, following the payment due dates. For secured property taxes, the first installment is due November 1 and delinquent after December 10, the second installment is due on February 1 and delinquent after April 10.

A report received from HdL at the end of 2021, indicated a preliminary net value change in property values up 7.4% over the 2020-21 tax roll, and indicates that property taxes are continuing an upward trend. The projection for Fiscal Year 2021-22 will come in at approximately \$111K higher, or 2% better than the Adopted Budget.

The change is attributed to the 1.036% Proposition 13 inflation adjustment of \$21.8 million, which accounted for 12% of all growth experienced in the City. Residential properties make up 56.4% of all values in the City and grew by \$62.1 million (4.4%), which accounted for 34.5% of all property value growth. Commercial properties added \$47.4 million (10.3%) and industrial properties added \$35.8 million (9.4%). Unsecured values increased by \$31.2 million (19.7%) on the strength of Epson America's new assessment of \$33.8 million.

Residential prices have continued to rise in response to lower inventory and low interest rates. The median sale price of a detached single family residential home in Los Alamitos from January through August 2021 was \$1.1 million. This represents a \$191K (21.68%) increase in median sale price over the prior year.

Sales & Use Taxes

A report from HdL, dated February 19, 2022, reported data for the quarter ending September, 2021. Sales were up 14.4% for the 3rd quarter 2021 compared to the same time frame for 2020, and reflected increases for most of the major business groups. Possible headwinds into 2022 could include pent up demand for travel, experiences shifting way from taxable goods, and expected interest rate hikes that will result in more costly financing. The projection and estimate for Sales & Use Taxes for Fiscal Year 2021-22 is \$3.2 million, slightly higher than Adopted Budget.

When taking a closer look at the individual business groups, autos and transportation reflected a strong demand that boosted the cost of new cars by 10% and used cars by 26%. Available inventory through 2022 is expected to be constrained, but shows signs of loosening. For building and construction, lumber prices rose in September due to commodity availability issues, and prices will remain high through mid-2022. For fuel and service stations, demand for all fuels is much higher than one year ago. The average price of a gallon of gas for California reached a record level of \$4.75 per gallon as of November 2021. Even with the with elevated prices, HdL is not anticipating a significant negative impact on the future consumption of fuel. Strong short-term gains are projected for the next three quarters.

For general consumer goods, concerns related to COVID case rates do not seem to be impacting consumer's ability and willingness to spend at retail establishments. Short-term expectations remain elevated, which is driven by higher customer charges and solid household fundamentals. The cost of taxable goods is expected to rise faster than sales. Recent results from hotels and entertainment venues demonstrate consumer desire to travel and spend more. However, rates for growth will likely vary significantly by region. For the state and county pools, year-to-date collections reflected that 42% came from marketplace facilitators and general retailers, another third from business-industry companies, and 11% from vehicle acquisitions primarily private-party sales processed through the DMV.

Measure Y (Local Sales Tax)

With successful passage of Measure Y, Los Alamitos is now benefiting from an additional 1.5% sales tax. New to the City's revenue stream, this has now become the largest source of revenue at 27.8% of total revenues collected by the City, and exceeds property tax which was traditionally the top revenue producer. Projections are greatly exceeding the budget, and the projection for Fiscal Year 2021-22 is \$5.6 million.

The primary reason for the large variance from the budget and the long-term model is that certain industry groups, like autos and transportation and general consumer goods, do not follow the true 150% ratio of transaction tax (Measure Y) to the Bradley-Burns (Sales & Use Tax), and are much higher ratios, driving the average across all industry groups to 173.4%. HdL has used a more conservative factor of 165% in their estimates. Even though the recorded history for Measure Y Local sales Tax is less than 12 months, the projections for the current fiscal year and beyond are promising.

Transit Occupancy Tax (TOT)

Transit Occupancy Tax (TOT) is trending at budget and includes the newest hotel, Fairfield by Marriott. Revenues for FY2021-22 may see an increase and exceed budget as travel and leisure activity resumes following the restrictions that have been imposed by the pandemic.

Fines & Forfeitures

Fines & Forfeitures include red light camera and parking fines, and other moving violations, and are currently trending lower than the budget. COVID related challenges have negatively impacted revenue from the Photo Enforcement program and parking citation revenue. Restrictions on businesses and public gatherings have resulted in less traffic and a reduction in violations. Additionally, staffing issues related to COVID resulted in less violations being reviewed and processed.

The Police Department lobby was also periodically closed to the public due to COVID which prevented access for the public should someone need to view video footage of their violation. As COVID related mandates are lifted, the Police Department is seeing an increase in activity and expects revenue to return to normal in the next fiscal year. With an anticipated retirement this year, a recruitment for Photo Enforcement Operator will be done so that the program is not impacted by a vacancy.

Overall, General Fund revenues for FY2021-22 are projected to exceed the Adopted Budget by \$1.1 million.

General Fund Expenditures

The financial summary below reflects the Adopted Budget General Fund Expenditures for Fiscal Year 2021-22, actual expenditures through December 31, 2021 and a projection to June 30, 2022.

For the most part, department expenditures are trending with the Adopted Budget. The three largest variances are in Police, Development Services, and Non-Departmental, as explained below.

Police

The Police department budget is projected to have a potential savings of approximately \$502K, reflecting vacancies in Youth Programs and Traffic divisions.

Development Services

Projections for Development Services for the Fiscal Year 2021-22 are estimated to be approximately \$283K higher than budget. This is mainly attributable to higher materials, supplies, and services for the three maintenance divisions.

Non-Departmental

Non-Departmental expenditures include contractual services not included in other department budgets, credit card processing fees, health insurance for retirees, and CIP projects funded by the General Fund, and additional approved Measure Y expenditures of \$275K with the recent award of contract bid for the Los Alamitos Street Improvement Project on Various Streets.

The Mid-Year Fiscal Year 2021-22 General Fund revenues are projected to exceed the Adopted Budget, with an estimated surplus of \$1.1 million. This is primarily attributable to higher than anticipated Measure Y Local Sales Tax. The estimated surplus is before any additional CIP needs, UAL paydown considerations, and any additional reserves. It is important to keep in mind that this estimate is not an exact science, and many other factors outside the City's control, like inflation, shifts in the economy, and global unrest,

may affect the outcome, and the final numbers will not be known until the end of the fiscal period.

Other Considerations for Discussion

PERS Unfunded Liability

A report for an early paydown option of the PERS Unfunded Liability (UAL) was presented to Council on June 21, 2021. At that time, Council requested staff to return to the BSC for additional study. A follow up report was provided to the BSC on August 23, 2021. Options to study the UAL included an independent actuarial study and the GovInvest Pension Liability Model. Approval to pursue and acquire the GovInvest modeling software was received.

At the January 25 meeting, the BSC received a presentation of the GovInvest pension model and its capabilities. Early paydown of the UAL is possible and savings range from \$3 million to \$9 million, depending on the level of funding. In addition, utilization of the City's Section 115 Trust was discussed. Further study is warranted to determine goals for an early payoff and funding of the UAL, along with accompanying policies.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact, as this report provides an update on the financial status of the General Fund revenues and expenditures relative to mid-year, and projection of Fiscal Year 2021-22.
